



Greenhills Police Department Monthly Report

July - August 2016



Dear Mayor and Members of Council:

The following is a summary of the activities of the Greenhills Police Department during the past month:

- On July 27, two of our Citizens Police Academy alumni were honored for their extraordinary service to the Greenhills Police Department and to the community. Jim Hadley and Beth Bolce-Owen each received the Citizen Appreciation Award from Mayor David Moore and Municipal Manager Evonne Kovach. We truly appreciate their contributions to the safety of our community.

- On August 4 and August 11, our supervisors interviewed six candidates for our two unfilled vacancies. The candidates were ranked and the current top two candidates are proceeding with background investigations.
- On August 12, we conducted safety training for teachers, staff, and administrators at the Winton Woods Primary North School and at the Middle School.
- Police Officer Rob Lenhoff was appointed on August 15. He is 26, single, and currently resides in West Chester. He is a 2008 graduate of Miamisburg High School, a 2012 graduate of Sinclair Community College with an Associate's Degree, and completed the Greene County Criminal Justice Academy in 2016. After receiving administrative and policy training, he will report to Sergeant Lukes for assignment to the street in the Field Training Officer program.
- On Saturday, September 10, we are offering a free self-defense class in the Council Chambers from 10 AM until 2 PM. There is no charge for the program, but residents must sign up in advance no later than Wednesday, September 7. At this writing, there are just a few spots left. The instruction will be a "real world" training program designed to teach citizens how to keep themselves safe. The instructor is Greenhills Police Officer Rob White, a state-certified self-defense instructor. Water and fruit snacks will be provided. - On Sunday, September 11 at 11:30 AM, I will be talking with the Adult Education Class at the Greenhills Community Presbyterian Church. Later in the day at 7 PM, both the Greenhills Police and Fire Departments will be participating in a 15th Anniversary September 11th Remembrance Procession and Ceremony starting at police and fire headquarters and ending at the gazebo on the commons.

- Our second Citizens Police Academy begins on September 15. Our inaugural class contained nine graduates, and we are happy that the second class will contain more than double. We currently stand at 20 members. There will be five sessions, culminating with a graduation on November 10. Members of CPA 1 will be assisting with the first session, and our instruction staff will include Evidence Technician and longtime Detective Bob Wright, Corporal Bryan Johnston, Sergeant Tim Lukes, Lieutenant Anne Ward, and me. We are currently accepting applicants for the winter 2016 class.
- On September 20, I will be speaking to a group at the Messiah Lutheran Church about the Greenhills Police Department and law enforcement.
- On September 22 at 9 AM, we are working on setting up a "Coffee with a Cop" program at the Village Troubadour. It will be an informal opportunity for our residents to come out and chat with officers about any community concerns. We are still working on finalizing details and will post additional information on our website as soon as it is available.



- Work continues on both our upcoming December on-site assessment from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, and our submissions to the State of Ohio's Law Enforcement Collaborative Project, which is due by next March. Accreditation Manager Vonda Secoy and Lieutenant Anne Ward are heading up these projects. We have scheduled a local preliminary review of our policies in October. It will be completed by supervisors and administrators from the Springfield Township and Fairfield Police Departments, both accredited agencies.



- During the month of July, the department investigated three accidents (down from nine in July of 2015), eight crimes (up from six last July), and 213 other incidents (up from 199 last July). Of a total of 636 contacts (670 last July), 313 were dispatched or received by telephone as compared to 271 last July, and 323 were self-initiated by police officers as compared to 399 last July. The department provided assistance to the public in 115 instances (103 times last July), assisted other agencies 34 times (down from 48 times last July), and made 48 criminal arrests (compared to 29 last July) and 75 traffic arrests (57 last July). Each crime was analyzed for geographic, temporal, and other factors. Details are attached.
